THE PLANNERS NETWORK - WHAT IS IT?

The Planners Network is an association of professionals, activists, academics, and students who are involved in physical, social, economic and environmental planning in urban and rural areas, and who support fundamental change in our political and economic system.

We believe that planning should be a tool for allocating resources and developing the environment in order to eliminate the great inequalities of wealth and power in our society, rather than to maintain and justify the status quo. This includes in particular racial injustice and discrimination by gender and sexual orientation. We believe that planning should be used to assure adequate food, clothing, shelter, health care, jobs, safe working conditions and a healthful environment. We advocate public responsibility for meeting these needs, because the private market has proven itself incapable of achieving these goals.

We seek to be an effective political and social force working with other progressive organizations to inform public opinion and public policy and to provide assistance to those seeking to understand, control and change the structural forces affecting their lives.

The Planners Network was established in 1975 as a communications vehicle for progressive planners to keep in touch with one another, share ideas and experiences, and discuss how their political values relate to their work and lives. The bi-monthy newsletter contains notes and information sent in by members, and information about other publications, conferences, jobs and resources. In 1981, a formal organization was created with a Steering Committee.

There are over 800 members in the United States and dozens in other countries. National Planners Network Conferences were held in 1979, 1981, 1986, 1994 and 1995. PN Sessions are also organized at conferences of the American Planning Association and Association of Collegiate Schools of Planning. In New York City, Network members present a forum series, and Network members in other cities periodically organize local events.

Annual financial contributions are voluntary, but are needed to cover operating expenses connected to the newsletter and annual conferences. The Steering Committee recommends the following minimums for Network members: \$15 for those with incomes under \$25,000, students and unemployed; \$25 for those with incomes between \$25,000 and \$50,000; and \$45 for those earning over \$50,000. Planners Network lost one of its most cherished and respected members on February 5, 1995 when Robert Mier died of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a result of exposure to Agent Orange during his Navy service in Vietnam. Rob, who was born and raised in St. Louis, received his B.S. in geology and civil engineering from the University of Notre Dame in 1965. He served as an officer in the United States Navy from 1965 to 1969 where he was decorated for his service in Vietnam. Rob left a promising career in the Navy when he resigned his commission because of his opposition to the war. He received his Master's in Regional Planning and his Ph.D. in City and Regional Planning at Cornell University in 1974 and joined the faculty of the University of Illinois at Chicago's School of Urban Planning and Policy Analysis. Rob was the founding director of UIC's Center for Urban Economic Development, one of the nation's most well-respected urban research and technical assistance centers. Rob served the City of Chicago from 1983 to 1989 during the tenures of Mayors Harold Washington and Eugene Sawyer as the Commissioner of Economic Development and Assistant to the Mayor for Development. Rob was the architect and chief implementor of Chicago's highly regarded 1984 Development Plan as well as the author of more than eighty scholarly publications and coauthor of two books. Rob is survived by his wife, Joan Fitzgerald, his sons Brian and Brendan Mier, his daughters, Lian Mier, Shelley Fitzgerald, and Nell Newton, of Washington, D.C. and his brother Fred Boehm of St. Louis, Missouri. The family has asked that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to a scholarship fund set up in his name. Planners Network will honor Rob on Sunday, May 21st by holding a three-hour town meeting to discuss crafting a progressive response to the "Contract with America." Rob was well known for his penchant for chairing such participatory political discussions and it seems fitting that Planners Network remember him at our Convention in this way!
